The annual conference of Docomomo Germany e.V. 2023 will take place in Frankfurt am Main in cooperation with the ernst-may-society e.V., the German Architecture Museum (DAM) and the City of Frankfurt. With the opening in Frankfurt's Paulskirche, a special conference venue is once again available.

The conference theme Politics-Society-Housing has been planned for a long time and is more topical than ever in Germany and in other European countries.

We see parallels to the situation in the 1920s, when the reform movement in Germany-and in other European countries-found not only a socio-political but also an architectural expression with the housing estates of Modern Movement. At this point, reform movement means a social (awakening) mood and setting the political course, e.g. for a supply of affordable and healthy living space. These developments are often associated with strong personalities, whether in a decisive position in public life or in the field of urban planning and architecture.

With the inscription of six Berlin settlements on the UNESCO World Heritage List in 2008 these efforts and design have been internationally recognized. With a future inscription of the settlements Römerstadt and Höhenblick as well as the Nidda Valley connecting them, the buildings of the New Frankfurt could expand the range of topics and thus also contribute to a general public awareness of the New Frankfurt as a holistic project with housing, infrastructure, green, leisure, sports, culture and education. Today, the issues of homelessness, social division and globalization are strongly intervening in the debate and demand political answers, on a national, regional and municipal level. This year's conference aims to make a contribution to the debate in Germany in an international context by including experiences and examples from other European countries into the discussion. To this end, the conference will be held in cooperation with the COST-Action Middle Class Mass Housing (MCMH-EU) with a central plenary opening in Paulskirche and parallel sessions in German and English in the facilities of the Stadthaus.

Questions we asked ourselves and like to discuss are: How has the City of Frankfurt, co-host of this conference, addressed these issues and what challenges lie ahead? How can we deal with the differentiated architectural heritage of the post-war period, in terms of urgently needed housing? And finally: in what way is housing in the 21st century subject to change, as it was 100 years ago?

In addition to contributions from architectural history and the field of heritage preservation, the event will also be deepened with positions from art, film and music, and supplemented by student works related to digitization and documentation.



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### Speakers: Brief vita

#### Mike Josef, City of Frankfurt, DE



Mike Josef has been full-time City Councilor and Head of Planning and Housing for the City of Frankfurt am Main since July 15, 2016, and has also been responsible for Sport since September 9, 2021. He was born in 1983 in Kameshly in Syria. As part of the Christian minority, his family left the country in 1987. In 1999 he obtained his secondary school leaving certificate at the Albert Einstein secondary school in Ulm-Wiblingen, and in 2002 he obtained his advanced technical college entrance qualification at the Fachoberschule in Neu-Ulm. From 2002 to 2003 he did his community service with the German Red Cross in Ulm. Josef studied political science, history and law at the Goethe University in Frankfurt from 2004 and graduated in 2010 with a degree in political science. From 2011 until his election to the magistrate, he was a city councilor for the SPD parliamentary group in Frankfurt's Römer and worked as organizational secretary at the DGB in south-east Hesse. From 2013 to 2022 Mike Josef was chairman of the Frankfurt SPD.

#### Franz Jaschke, Docomomo Deutschland e.V., DE



Franz Jaschke, graduated with a diploma in architecture from Technische Universität Berlin, Germany. Since 1983 he collaborates with Winfried Brenne and he is a managing partner of BRENNE ARCHITEKTEN GmbH in Berlin since 2002. He is a member of Association of German Architects (BDA), German Association of Craftsmen (DWB), Bauhaus Archive Berlin, Association for the Monument Trade Union School in Bernau (Baudenkmal Bundesschule Bernau), Ernst May Society Frankfurt, German National Committee ICOMOS and is a Founding member of DOCOMOMO Germany, and its current chair. Among other prizes together with Winfried Brenne, he was awarded the inaugural World Monuments Fund/Knoll Modernism Prize in 2008 for the restoration of the former Bundesschule des ADGB (Federal School of the German Trade Union Confederation) in Bernau in accordance with the requirements for monument preservation.

#### Andrea Jürges, German Architecture Museum (DAM), DE



Andrea Jürges studied architecture at the TU Darmstadt. After graduating, she worked in various architectural offices. From 2001 to 2003, she worked as a freelance editor for the digital architecture portal BauNetz. Afterwards, Andrea Jürges was responsible for the entire communication for the new ECB premises at the European Central Bank (ECB) for almost 12 years, from the competition to the inauguration. Since February 2017, she has been deputy director of the German Architecture Museum (DAM) in Frankfurt am Main. Together with Yorck Förster, the architect curated the exhibition „Große Oper - Viel Theater?“ which opened at the DAM in 2018 and subsequently traveled to several major German cities. Jürges is also a member of the staff unit „Future of the Municipal Theaters,“ also in Frankfurt am Main. As a representative of the Deutsches

Architekturmuseum, the deputy director has been involved in the national urban development project of the German Federal Ministry of Transport, Building and Urban Affairs, „Post Corona Stadt,“ since 2021 and plays a key role in the conception and implementation of the Frankfurt projects. In addition, Andrea Jürges is involved in the state initiative „Großer Frankfurter Bogen,“ which was launched by the Hessian Ministry of Economics, Energy, Transport and Housing in 2019. She is also responsible for the conception and implementation of event programs for current urban development topics in a Tel Aviv-Frankfurt partnership.

#### Ana Vaz Milheiro, ISCTE, Lisbon, PT



Researcher at DINÂMIA'CET-IUL, Assistant Professor with Aggregation at the Faculty of Architecture at Lisbon University. Former IIAS Fellow (Israel Institute for Advanced Studies, Hebrew University of Jerusalem), from the research group "Re-Theorizing Housing as Architecture Research" (2019-20). PhD (2004) in Architecture and Urbanism from the University of São Paulo, Brazil. Chair of the Cost-Action CA18137 "European Middle-Class Mass Housing" (2019-23). PI of five research projects focused on architecture and urban planning in former Portuguese colonial African countries and middle-class housing, financed by the Foundation for Science and Technology, including the ongoing project "Middle-Class Mass Housing ..." (ARTDAQ/30594/2017) and more recently "Dominance and mass-violence through Housing and Architecture during colonial war." Art and architecture critic and essayist prize by the Portuguese Section of AICA/ Fundação Carmona e Costa (2013) with "Nos Trópicos sem Le Corbusier. Arquitetura Luso-Africana no Estado Novo" (2012). Invited researcher at Ghent University (2015-16) and Fellow Researcher at University of São Paulo (2018).

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### Keynote

**Astrid Wuttke, schneider+schumacher Weiterbauen GmbH, Frankfurt (DE)**  
Conversion culture

Around 75% of the existing residential buildings in Germany were built after 1949. The sheer quantity is contrasted with a Baukultur value that is estimated to be rather low. However, this building fabric and its further development is becoming increasingly important - as a cultural heritage, but also in relation to sustainability and climate neutrality. Continuing to build means much more than maintaining the status quo, namely treating buildings with respect but also courage, recognizing potential and skillfully developing individual, unmistakable and new, independent solutions in which supposed disadvantages become qualities. Here in particular, innovation and experimentation are more in demand than ever.



Astrid Wuttke (\*1972) in Langen, architect. Studied architecture at Darmstadt Technical University until 1999, joined schneider+schumacher/Frankfurt in 2002 and has been a member of the management team at schneider+schumacher Planungsgesellschaft mbH since 2008. Important projects are conversion and renovation of the BGH Westgebäude in Karlsruhe and the exhibition buildings Mathildenhöhe in Darmstadt (UNESCO World Heritage), as well as the residential complex Markgrafencarree, Berlin and the renovation of the Städelschule in Frankfurt. Since 2014 she has been chair of the working group „Architects in the Preservation of Historical Monuments and Building in Existing Contexts“ of AK Hessen and since 2017 she has been a member of the Hessian State Monuments Council as a representative of AK Hessen. In addition, she has been managing partner of schneider+schumacher Weiterbauen GmbH since 2021. She is also chairwoman of the ernst-may-society e.V.

Philipp Sturm (\*1976) in Suhl, Political scientist. Since 2008 freelance curator and author at the German Architektur Museum (DAM), Frankfurt am Main. Exhibitions include „Himmelstürmend - Hochhausstadt Frankfurt“ (2014), „Linie Form Funktion - Die Bauten von Ferdinand Kramer“ (2015), „Die immer Neue Altstadt - Bauen zwischen Dom und Römer seit 1900“ (2018) and „Paulskirche - Ein Denkmal unter Druck“ (2019). He also curated the exhibition „Paulskirche - Democracy, Debate, Monument“ (2022) in the Wandelhalle of the Paulskirche. Since 2018, he has been the managing director of the ernst-may-society e.V., which, in cooperation with the City of Frankfurt and the State Monuments Office, wrote the application of the New Frankfurt for the German Tentative List for UNESCO World Heritage in 2021.

Since 2016 officer and since 2021 deputy office manager in the Department of Planning, Housing and Sports of the City of Frankfurt am Main, responsible for flagship projects of urban planning and development as well as the World Heritage application New Frankfurt. Since 2016, head of the New Frankfurt Project Group, since 2019, management of the investment program „National Projects of Urban Development: Upgrading the Settlements of New Frankfurt“, since 2020, head of the New Frankfurt World Heritage Steering Committee. Christina Treutlein, (\*1980) in Schweinfurt, studied art history and cultural management in Berlin, Marburg, Naples and Görlitz. She works as deputy managing director for the ernst-may-gesellschaft in Frankfurt am Main, which wrote the application of the New Frankfurt for the German Tentative List for UNESCO World Heritage in cooperation with the City of Frankfurt and the Landesdenkmalamt in 2021.

Uta Pottgiesser, is Professor of Heritage & Technology at TU Delft (Netherlands) and Professor of Building Construction and Materials at the Detmold School for Architecture and Interior Architecture, TH OWL (Germany). From 2017-2019 she was appointed as Professor of Interior Architecture at the Faculty of Design Sciences of the University of Antwerp (Belgium) and was spokesperson of the Henry van der Velde Research Group. She is Board Member of DOCOMOMO Germany since 2016 and was Chair of the DOCOMOMO International Specialist Committee on Technology (ISC/T) from 2016-2021. Since 2022 she serves as Chair of DOCOMOMO International. Besides her academic career she acts as a jury member in architectural competitions and as a practising architect in Berlin.

Maren Harnack (Prof. Dr.-Ing. MSc, urban planner, architect) studied architecture, urban planning and social sciences in Stuttgart, Delft and London. She was a research assistant at the TU Darmstadt and the HafenCity University in Hamburg before becoming a professor of urban planning at the Frankfurt University of Applied Sciences in 2011, where she initiated the research laboratory Postwar Modernity together with colleagues. Since 2008 she has been running the office urbanorbit together with Mario Tvrtkovic. She has participated in numerous research projects and publishes regularly in various professional media.



Natalie Heger (Prof. Dr.-Ing., Architect) is a substitute professor for urban planning and design at the Frankfurt University of Applied Sciences. With the interdisciplinary cooperative u Lab, Studio for City and Spatial Processes, she works at the intersection of architectural practice and theory and in the field of urban design and urban research on topics such as climate-friendly and public welfare-oriented urban development, circular society, and participatory design. She is a member of the Postwar Modernism Research Laboratory and is currently researching housing and quality of life in large housing estates. She studied architecture in Berlin and Barcelona and previously worked as a stage and costume designer.

Ritz Ritzer studied architecture at TU Munich and at E.T.S.A.B Barcelona. Cooperative Conditions



Anne Kockelkorn is Assistant Professor of History and Theory of the City and the Architecture of Urban Housing at the University of Gent in Belgium. Her research in urban and architectural history is focused on the intersections between design, territorial politics and processes of subjectivation since the 19th century. Her forthcoming monograph *The Social Condenser II* investigates the representation and production of large-scale housing complexes in France before and after the neoliberal reforms of 1977, for which she won the ETH Silver Medal for outstanding doctoral theses in 2018. Together with Susanne Schindler and Rebekka Hirschberg, she is currently preparing the book *Cooperative Conditions: A Primer on Architecture, Finance and Regulation* in Zurich (Zurich: gta Verlag). The project explains the regulatory framework and agency of cooperative housing in Zurich since the 1920s and evolved from a research and exhibition project with the students of MAS GTA ETH in spring 2020.



Susanne Schindler is an architect and historian interested in the mutual construction of architecture, finance, and regulation in housing. She uses history to understand the present and connects varied sources across national boundaries to challenge the assumptions that shape how we envision the future of living together. Schindler holds a professional degree in architecture from Berlin University of the Arts and a PhD in architectural history from ETH Zurich. Since 2109, Schindler has been senior lecturer and co-director of the MAS Program in the History and Theory of Architecture at ETH Zurich. She currently teaches urban design at Harvard GSD.



Rebekka Hirschberg is an architect and housing researcher. She studied architecture in Graz, Lille and Hong Kong, and completed the MAS in History and Theory of Architecture at ETH Zurich. In 2018, Rebekka has co-founded the independent collective *wohnlabor* ([www.wohnlabor.at](http://www.wohnlabor.at)) – researching on (collective) housing, models of financing and urban planning in Austria. Rebekka worked for various architecture offices in Graz and Zurich, and as a research assistant at Hong Kong University and ETH Zurich. Currently, she is a PhD candidate in the Department of Architecture and Urban Planning at Ghent University.

#### Nicole De Togni

Nicole De Togni, Adjunct professor at Politecnico di Torino, research fellow at Université Rennes 2 and TA at Politecnico di Milano. Her research deals with the narratives related to the city, considered from a diachronic perspective. In a long-term historiographic and interpretative reading of the urban context, narratives are intended as privileged lenses to investigate the circulation, hybridization, or institutionalization of political, urban, and architectural models and their interrelation with socio-cultural aspects. Among her latest publications: "Multiple Narrations of Peripheral Mass Housing" in Ground level-scape mass-housing, Listlab2022 (with Kërçuku), "Neglected narratives of post-war Italian cities" in A Continent of Urban Planning, Routledge2022 (with Caramellino).

#### Els De Vos

Els De Vos, Professor at the University of Antwerp. Her research concerns the field of history and theory of (interior) architecture, home culture and public space in the 20th century. She published her Ph.D. with the University Press Leuven and has co-edited several volumes, including Reuse of modernist buildings: a case study handbook. She has curated different exhibitions, including Living in Colour. As WG2 Leader in the COST-Action 'European Middle-Class Mass-Housing', she focuses on definitions and concepts to study MCMH.

#### Sotiria Alexiadou

Sotiria Alexiadou, studied Architecture in University of Thessaly (2007). Attended the MSc. in Urban Strategies, Applied Arts University Vienna (2010) and the MSc. in Protection, Conservation and Restoration of Cultural Monuments, Aristotle University (2016). Earned her doctorate from University of Thessaly's Architecture Department (2022). Her research focuses on architecture and urban development mechanisms of the 20th Century. She taught in classes in the University of Cyprus, University of Thessaly, and Aristotle University and in design teams of architectural competitions earning distinctions. Her research and architecture projects were presented at conferences and exhibitions.

#### Yael Allweil

Yael Allweil, (Ph.D. University of California, Berkeley) is Associate Professor at Faculty of Architecture and Town Planning, Technion, Israel where she heads HousingLab research group. Her research was published in the monograph Homeland: Zionism as Housing Regime 1860-2011 (Routledge, 2017) and journal articles in Urban Studies, ACME, City, Urban Planning and others.
